A few words on our readings

Isaiah 40:12-17. 27-31 This is written towards the end of the Israelites' captivity in Babylon when Babylon falls to the Persians. Isaiah proclaims the supremacy of God the Creator of the Universe and the Redeemer of humankind. He is the everlasting God, the creator of the ends of the earth. He is the God who consoles and gives strength to those who believe in him. This is a powerful message for us today, yearning for the end of lockdown. Those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength. The final images are often quoted, they are words of great hope and encouragement which we all need at this time.

They shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.

2 Corinthians 13:11-13 Paul's message contains the very essence of our common life in Christ and his advice remains as relevant to the members of the Church today as they were then. Although the doctrine of the Trinity had not yet been formulated it is clear that in the words of 'The Grace' the Early Church understood the threefold nature of the one God. The Grace is often used to conclude both worship and meetings, but we can make it our prayer for each other today and every day.

Matthew 28: 11-13 Just a couple of weeks after we celebrated the Ascension of our Lord we return to that same event as Jesus takes final leave of his disciples, giving them his Great Commission to reveal God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Those who become his disciples are to be baptised in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. These very words are repeated at baptism to this day and will be repeated to the end of time.

Last week we prayed for the coming of the Holy Spirit, this week we pray that the Holy Spirit may bring the wind of change into our lives and the life of the Church.

God of wind and dove and fire, speak freedom, peace and change over lands divided by war and by creed. Speak refreshment, assurance and warmth over lives afflicted by exhaustion and illness. Speak integrity, humility and challenge over churches crippled by fear and finances. Speak calm, gentleness and comfort over lives broken by grief and loss. Speak power, anointing and healing over each one of us, that there may be new beginnings, and a catalyst for change.

Henry was a knowledgeable and interesting historian and so, instead of using a specially written prayer for Trinity Sunday, may I suggest we use a well-loved prayer from the 16th century which Henry would have known. be unto thee, O holy and glorious Trinity,
Father, Son and Holy Spirit,
by all creatures, all men, all angels,
